The second edition of WHO ENCC provides the foundation for the essential care of every newborn and includes 3 course options:

- Basic course: made up of two parts (ENC 1 and ENC 2) and incorporates all content of the HBS courses, updated to align with WHO recommendations and guidelines
- Modular course: covers the same topics as the Basic Course, more in-depth with 14 modules
- Combination: a combo of the Basic course and selected modules from Modular course can
 be offered
